The SAIFD Trillium Chapter hosted the annual Artist in Residence (AIR) program in February of this year with Guest Designer Anne

Leeson AIFD, CFD. Anne has been a member of the floral industry in Canada for many years. She has been involved in numerous floral design shows and panels and gives workshops at various institutions throughout the country.

Anne's design skills are seen in many floral industry showrooms, on catalogue covers, and in publications. She is also actively involved in teaching seminars and workshops in the city and across the country. Anne represented Canada at the FTD World Cup Event in Melbourne, Australia in 2004 and since that time has supported FTD at other events and shows in the USA. More recently she presented a

display at the Malaysian Floral Spectacular in Kuala Lumpur.

Anne's workshop with the SAIFD Trillium Chapter focused on the creation of dynamic, visually exciting floral arrangements

> with unusual foliage and a variety of green materials. She stressed that using traditional greens and foliage in non-traditional ways challenges the designer to expand his/her notions of what constitutes a good design. Anne demonstrated some very innovative and contemporary floral techniques, such as weaving and binding grasses.

The second part of her presentation included a hands-on workshop with the SAIFD members, who were so excited to experiment with the techniques Anne was demonstrating. Students experimented with small callas, decorative pins and decorative wires to create a contemporary style arrangement which was an exciting project for the students. Anne's

workshop was a great success and every student was filled with new inspiration.

At the end of May, I took a visit to Seoul, Korea with my husband, Mike, for a fun "vacation." We don't take the normal beach type of vacation, we try to go to a new country at least once a year - and so this year, Seoul, Korea it was. What a wonderfully vibrant city it is. Of course, no trip to Korea would be complete without a visit to AIFD's Korean family! We were able to meet up with two AIFD members, Yeon Hwan Kim AIFD, CFD (far left in photo) and Joo Young Park AIFD, CFD (second from right in photo), and of course what would any AIFD meeting in Korea be without having our very own Ms. Sook (far right in photo) in attendance to help translate the discussion!

Koreans are known to be quite generous people, and our AIFD family in Korea lived up to their name by treating us to a traditional Korean meal at a lovely restaurant in Insadong which included 11 courses! Just when we thought the meal was over, another course came out. That happened about five times.

I had a chance to discuss many AIFD related topics with Yeon, Joo, and Ms. Sook, including things that were going well for members in Korea, for instance they now have Ms. Sook as their designated liaison to AIFD National Headquarters, which helps facilitate distribution of directories and certificates, as well as better communicating their questions and answers to and from Korean AIFD members. We also discussed some challenges they face, such as the Certified Floral Judge/ Evaluator test and online courses only being offered in English. While AIFD continues to grow internationally in leaps and bounds, it is still quite the challenge to figure out how to best serve our international members yet remain fiscally responsible for the organization as a whole. It is important to



hear this sort of feedback from our international members and treat them as we would our members in the States to our best ability.

It was a wonderful evening, and one to remember. Usually it is our Korean members who have to make the long journey to the states, so after I personally made the long journey to Seoul (25 hours of travel door to door, and a 13 hour time zone difference) I have a new found respect for these dedicated floral designers who make the same trek only to participate in the PFDE the very next day! The commitment they show to AIFD and the floral industry as a whole should not go unnoticed, and the same holds true for Ms. Sook - she truly cares about AIFD and its member's in Korea. What a wonderful trip it was, made complete only by our AIFD visit!

Achieving Balance on Furpose

Balance is necessary for us to be happy in our daily lives. Home, family, work, finances and pretty much everything we do require balance of some sort. Balanced diet and work-life balance are just two themes that we consider every day. How we achieve that balance is not always clear but is a constant work in progress.

In our floral design world we are also searching for balance. For an arrangement to be both pleasing and functional it must be balanced, yet there are many aspects of balance to be considered. Learning to achieve balance physically, visually, symmetrically or asymmetrically can be challenging but it is a fundamental and essential principle of floral design.

Our class will give you the opportunity to create a design utilizing many of the factors that influence balance. Often it is the little things that make the big difference achieving that sought after balance. Color, space, both positive and negative, line, proportion as well as physical placement, altered slightly, can shift a design from being imbalanced to perfect balance. Flower Trend #1 - Luxurious

Luxurious is an airy garden style with texture, beautiful shapes and patterns. A romantic whimsical look and feel with garden elements. This trend is popular with this season's weddings.

Flowers: Artisan Roses/ Garden Roses, Dahlias, Cushion Gerberas, Miniature



Gerberas, Hydrangeas, Miniature Callas, Phalaenopsis Orchids, Leucospemum (Pin Cushions), Dianthus, Green Trick/Green Ball, Hypericum, Bupleurum, Boxwood.

Colors: Citrus and berry colors like reds, pinks, oranges, salmon, and coral are a focal point in these arrangements. Orange is set to be the prominent color.

Accent Colors: Vibrant greens, violets, white, and gold help accent the arrangement.

Flower Trend #2 - Urban Bright



Urban Bright is a new urban dynamic with bright colors that has a bohemian 1960-70's retro look. Great for modern spaces to add a pop of color. These arrangements tend to have a organic look with loosely gathered groupings.

Flowers: Gerberas, Zinnias, Sunflowers, Cymbidium and Phalaenopsis Orchids, Stock, Hydrangeas, Lisianthuses, Hybrid Tea Roses, Miniature Callas,

Craspedia (Billy Buttons), Succulents, Delphinium, Celosia, Chrysanthemum.

Colors: Rich saturated reds, purples, teals, and black as the neutral color

Accents Colors: Oranges, yellow, and greens help finish this trend off.

Flower Trend #3 -**Industrial Chic**

A new take on your traditional elegant flowers. A rich combination of metallic sheen and sparkle for the modern customer. Arrangements are elegant, Focal Points 8



formal, and with metal textures.

Flowers: Calla Lily, Ranunculus, Roses, Tulip, Carnation, Stock, Spray roses, Roses.

Color: Solid whites and ivory are the main focal point of this trend.

Accent Colors: Black, silver, copper, gold, bronze, brass, and rose gold.

Flower Trend #4 - Vintage Soft

Vintage soft is influenced by soft pastel hues, prints,

patterns, and textures. This trend maintains the mono-chromatic look with soft hues for a complementary addition to any atmosphere.

Flowers: Hybrid tea, Spray and Garden roses, Hybrid Lilies, Parrot Tulips, Hydrangeas, Lisianthuses,



Miniature Callas, Stock, Larkspur, Queen Anne's Lace, Dusty Miller, Seeded Eucalyptus.

Colors: These pastel colors are muted, washed out and almost neutral. Blush pink, aqua, mint green, frost white, and shell gray create that soft look.

Accent Colors: Lavenders, yellows, soft greens, platinum and pewter bring this soft vintage look together.

Flowers: Irises, Hybrid Delphiniums, Larkspur, Oriental and O.T. Lilies, Tulips, Sunflowers, Antique Hydrangeas, Hybrid tea, spray, and garden roses, Lisianthuses, Succulents

and Tillandsia, Ornamental grasses, Produce (Kale, Artichokes, peppers, etc.) Vines and branches.

Colors: This trend brings tints, tones, and shades of blue for the body of this arrangement.

Accent colors: Warm hues of yellow, green, beige and white with a touch of iron, bronze and gold bring this modern texture to life.

CFD, Golden West College Floral Design program alumni, was the guest educator. Ivana's expertise in the floral industry spans from owning her own business, Ivan's Floral Décor, to competing in the California State Floral Association's Top-Ten Competition earning Top Ten status and People's Choice winner in 2011, and People's Choice winner and FIRST place in 2013. Ivana's work has been published in multiple magazines and she is an advocate of continued education.

Ivana's presentation was titled "Designing for Professional Events and Weddings." Students of the Shirley Haas SAIFD Chapter extended this educational opportunity to fellow Golden West College students, alumni, the floral industry and the community. The outcome of the students' marketing efforts and community outreach turned out to be a successful full-house! Each guest had the pleasure of learning from Ivana's well-planned lecture and demonstrations. Our students also spent time with Ivana while she was preparing for her show. They are very grateful to have the chance to work with Ivana before and during the show, one-on-one, learning new techniques and sharing in this amazing experience.

The AIR program showcased two professional events and

two weddings. For professional events, Ivana discussed the importance of complementing but not taking away from the event and the speaker, creating pieces that reflect an overall color scheme and theme, yet standout as statement designs on their own. She encouraged the students to have the courage to create designs that deviate from current and overdone trends.

In the first event, Ivana focused on the use of bright sunny colors and sunflowers. Ivana created a podium and stage design that showcased the use of different textures and movement by utilizing complementary and contrasting florals and colors. The sunflower theme was further expressed by a large floral

wall, using Oasis Floral Foam Tiles. Ivana shared her method of outlining a pattern on the floral foam canvas and bringing her floral art to life using a pave technique. She also recommended the value of designing a take-away piece, such as a bouquet to be giving as a prized take-home gift to the main speaker or event host. Ivana shared that not only is this gesture well received but it further assists in developing strong business relationships. Each client, speaker, host, guest, etc. you meet and work with

The second event Ivana presented was a scenario in which the only request from the client is a particular color scheme. This specific color scheme was a request for bright purple, red, and turquoise hues. Ivana shared products such as Design Master Just for Flowers to turn an ordinary flower into a one-of-a-kind unique floral that is now rare and exquisite. Another surprise to this contemporary corporate design was the use of mesh wire from the hardware store to weave throughout her pieces creating movement and textured bling. The designs showcased for this colorful event were cocktail table pieces, a centerpiece, a podium piece, and another fantastic floral wall.

Ivana's wedding designs verified her design expertise as she softened the palette while continuing to use unique design techniques. The highlight of this event was a special creation of soft pinks, cream and white florals designed as a three-dimensional "painting" of an over-filled abundant vase of

beautiful flowers. Ivana dismantled an actual painting, and then used the beautiful frame, added a customized vase and fresh flowers to create this distinctive and gorgeous floral art piece.

The First Lady's Luncheon, held May 12, honors the First Lady of the United States and is attended by more than 1,500 people, including congressional spouses, cabinet members and other VIPs.

For a glamorous tradition this spring in Washington, D.C., the First Lady and her staff turned to flowers grown in the United States.

The Certified American Grown program worked this year with the Congressional Club to ensure all of the flowers and foliage used were grown domestically. Flowers and greens from California, Oregon, Washington, Florida and Virginia could be found in more than 200 centerpieces and arrangements in a theme of "Posh, Peach, Southern Hospitality."

Andrea Gagnon of LynnVale Studios in Gainesville, Virginia, designed the centerpieces and said she was inspired by the state flower of Georgia, the "Cherokee Rose."

"I imagined our 'garden-inspired' florals to be reflective of the myriad flowers and foliages that might be grown, gathered and arranged by any southern hostess preparing for a much anticipated elegant event where her guests ease and comfort were paramount," she said. "We hoped they would convey through their delicate textures, soft feminine color palette and lush blooms the event's overall theme."

Gagnon said that while she did not get to see Michelle Obama's reaction to the work, she was impressed with the First Lady's overall message of thanks to the gathered crowd.

"I was touched by her remarks of gratitude toward the members of the Congressional Club who had reached out to her and supported her when she first came to Washington so many years ago," she said.

David Beahm Experiences of New York carried out Gagnon's vision and provided logistical support for the floral installation.

ymposium is only weeks away! So we wanted to celebrate by highlighting the Official State Flower of California, the California Poppy.

The California poppy (Eschscholzia Californica), belonging to the Papaveraceae family, was designated the state flower of California in 1903. Also known as the flame flower, la amapola, and copa de oro (cup of gold), the California poppy grows wild throughout the state. Native Americans in California valued the poppy as a food source and for the oil extracted from the plant.

Every year, April 6 is California Poppy Day and May 13 - 18 is Poppy Week. Gold is a theme in California symbols; the state colors are blue and gold, the state nickname is The Golden State, and gold is the official state mineral.

Golden Poppy is a perennial and one of the earliest wild flowers to grow in gardens. The blossoms are 2-3 inch cups of gold, bronze, scarlet, terra cotta, rose or white. Golden Poppy bloom on plants with silvery green foliage, about a foot high and usually broader than they are tall. Golden Poppy flowers are seen from February to September. The Golden Poppy flowers are 1-2 inches across, with four wide fan-shaped petals, and many stamens.



Facts About Golden Poppy

- The Golden Poppy plant has Fern-like leaves with single flowers on a long stalk.
- Golden Poppy leaves are 3/4-4" long divided into narrow segments on long stalks.
- Golden Poppy bloom in open areas, grassy or sandy slopes.
- Golden Poppy is found in southern California to southern Washington, east to Texas.
- Golden Poppy flower is used in landscaping for a temporary spring display by scattering the seed in the fall.
- · California Indians cherished the Golden Poppy as both a source of food and for oil extracted from the plant.
- The true poppy genus is Papaver, but many flowers of related genera are also called poppies.
- · Golden Poppy seed, also called maw seed, is not narcotic and is used as birdseed and for a flavoring or garnish in baking.
- · Golden Poppy seed is also ground for flour.
- Poppy oil, derived from the Golden Poppy seeds, is employed in cooking and illumination and in paints, varnishes, and soaps.
- The Golden Poppy has been the symbol of the dead and of sleep since antiquity.

How did the California Poppy become the state flower?

In 1890 the California State Floral Society held an election to determine the state's signature flower. The contestants were the Mariposa Lilly, the Matilija Poppy and the frontrunner, a plant already known as the California Poppy. "According to all reports, it smashed its opposition," **Char Miller**, director of the environmental analysis program at Pomona College, said about the California Poppy. It took more than a decade for the legislature to make the title official.




